Electoral Roll Report 2025

Following a complete revision, as is required every six years, the electoral roll now stands at 100, which is 31 fewer than last year. 43 members left the roll, and 12 new members joined with 88 parishioners renewing their membership.

The Fabric of the Church and Church Hall

Our buildings are there to provide safe and usable environments for the church family and the wider community and visitors. The wardens, PCC and the members of the fabric committee work to ensure the upkeep of the buildings through planned and budgeted routine maintenance, emergency repairs when required, the development of future projects for the renovation and improvement of the facilities provided and the ongoing performance of inspections to ensure the health and safety of all users.

This work continued through 2024 and at the end of the year there were no major issues outstanding relating to the church or church hall buildings.

Fabric projects completed in 2024 are as follows:

- Installation of a new fire alarm system in the church hall *
- Renovation and regilding of the church clock face *

(* These projects were fully financed by funds raised by the Olney Pancake Race)

- Renovation of the outer North doors and regilding of the badges
- Update to the 'Rectors' Board'
- Major upgrade to the Broadband and wi-fi system in church
- Installation of a new wi-fi system in the church hall

The latest quinquennial reports covering the church and church hall are both dated 2021 so further inspections are not due until 2026

Projects for 2025, 2026 and beyond, under discussion or approved, are as follows:


- Renovation of the stonework around the West Doors and tower faces
- West end reordering, completion and costing of proposals
- Work with the Architect to develop a plan for the demolition of the existing shed and the erection of a modern storage facility
- Clear the sensory garden at the rear of the church hall and extend the safe play area
- Replacement of the lights in the choir stalls
- Work to the 11 yew trees in the churchyard to remove elder, ivy, etc. and to raise the crowns where appropriate
- Develop proposals for the renovation of the church hall windows
- Redecoration of the church and porch ceilings

Deanery Synod Report

The Benefice and Parish of Olney is part of the Deanery of Newport in the Archdeaconry of Buckingham in the Diocese of Oxford. Deanery Synod representatives are elected for a three year term from 2023 to 2026. Current representatives of the laity are Malcolm Jones, Andrew Geary and Kate Nicholas. Kate also serves on Diocesan Synod and Malcolm on the Deanery Pastoral Standing Committee.

After much discussion and meetings, the plan for pastoral reorganisation of the Deanery has finally been approved. This has resulted in the proposed creation of two new benefices, Ouse Valley West and Ouse Valley North – the names chosen as the diocese stipulated the use of geographical names rather than acronyms such as SCAN. The Benefices of SCAN, Newport, and Hanslope with Castlethorpe remain as currently configured.

Olney will be part of Ouse Valley North, together with Lavendon with Cold Brayfield, Newton Blossomville, Clifton Reynes, Emberton, and Tyringham with Filgrave. Timing is dependent on the retirement of the current rector of Lavendon, sometime in 2025. There will be two stipendiary posts associated with the benefice, the Rector of Ouse Valley North in Olney and another stipendiary post in Lavendon. While the rector will be a full time position, the other post may be anywhere from 0.5 to 1.0 full time equivalent, although at a meeting of parish treasurers it was agreed to aim for the higher end of this range.



The deanery was also asked by the diocese to prepare a plan based on developing youth and children's ministry and Louise Cook from Emberton has begun research on current activities and needs in the deanery. Nearly 50% of the 14 and under age group in the deanery live in Newport, nearly 20% in Olney Parish and 27% will be in the Ouse Valley North Benefice.

As part of her LLM training, Louise is working with the Youth Café at Quarrendon in Aylesbury and in contact with some of the Deanery level Youth Workers, building on experience and constantly seeing new things. Her current focus is on learning what is being successful in the deanery, such as our Church Mice and Holiday Bible Club and other initiatives in Emberton.

Deanery events in 2024 included the Night of Miracles Cantata and Deanery Evensong in Emberton and a series of talks by the area dean on Science and Christian Faith in Newport.

Holiday Bible Club, led by the joint Churches of Olney, took place once again this year and was well supported. We went travelling at "Light Speed" to learn about Jesus and are looking forward to going to "Arctica" this August 11th to 15th.

Memory Club

Memory Club is the church's outreach to older people in the town. Olney Pancake Race

13 th February 2024 saw the 77 th running of the race in the modern era, and the 75th running of the International race against Liberal since its introduction in 1950. The day dawned overcast and threatening, and sure enough the rain started at about 9.15 and continued for most of the morning. Despite the weather, the turnout was excellent and probably more in number than the previous year.

Financially the year had been very challenging for the organising committee as our long-term main sponsors, Teflon, had advised us in October 2023 that they could not support the race for 2024 as their European operations were being cut back. This had a serious impact upon our likely finances as not only did they contribute financially, they also paid for the marquee, the kitchen, all of the frying pans, aprons, headscarves and the celebrity chef.

After months of hard work, we eventually secured new sponsorship through Whitworth Bros., Kingsley Healthcare and McCarthy Stone which with the continued and long term support from Francis Jackson Homes Limited enabled us to stage the event with only a few changes in format to previous years. Despite a large increase in our expenditure, we did manage to offset some of this by our performance on the income side with nearly 1000 more raffle tickets being sold than in 2023, and other sales were increased as well. This all enabled us to achieve an excess of income over expenditure of nearly $\mathfrak{L}4,700$, which was an excellent achievement in the circumstances.

To celebrate the 75th International race, we decided to present special engraved glass trophies to the winners of the race on both sides of the Atlantic. The winner of the Olney race was presented with the silver platter from Liberal, the glass trophy and a copy of the Olney Hymns. Our winner was Kaisa Larkas, but we later found out that we had narrowly been pipped at the post by Pamela Bolivar from Liberal. This brings the win count to Olney 32 and Liberal 40 (with three years not counting for various reasons.)

Organisation and Communication

A major project over the last year was the establishment of a new "olneyparish.org" website and set of email addresses, replacing the old "olney.church" ones. Our Pews News now has a weekly version, which gives information about services and events in the coming week(s), and a monthly version, which looks back at events in the last month. Our social media pages are a means of communicating with the wider town, and the number of people following these pages is increasing. Our "members and friends" Facebook group continues to run and has a steady membership of just under 200. More recently we have refreshed the notice boards in the church and porch. We have a license for "Canva" software which allows us to create high quality posters using consistent fonts and colour schemes. The Canva software also allows us to build up a library of posters, images and logos which means that posters can quickly be created or amended.

Members of the team are currently involved in promotional materials for the 700th Anniversary celebrations, including event programmes, posters, magazine articles and online communications.
